Welcome to Polk County Fair 2016

Animals, trains, rodeo, 'world's largest caramel popcorn ball' featured

he Polk County Fair will be bursting at the seams when it comes to animal exhibits.

"We are going to be really full. We are putting them in every nook and cranny," said Tina Andersen, fair manager. "We are trying to stretch that small animal barn to make it bigger."

While the situation could be the cause of some logistical headaches, Andersen likes that 4-H and FFA exhibits are taking up all available space and then some.

"It's a good problem to have," Andersen said.

Animals may be the star of the event, but Polk County Fair 2016, "Boots, Chaps, and Cowboy Hats" will have plenty more to offer during its three-day run starting Thursday.

The world's largest caramel popcorn ball, helicopter tours and camel rides are three of the more unusual attractions.

Those looking for county fair staples, the truck and tractor pull, beautiful baby contest, the Raw Hide Express Train and

booth after booth of fried goodies can be found.

"I'm very happy to announce we have elephant ears back," Andersen said.

The doughy delicacy can be found at the Country Treasures booth, run by a couple from Falls City.

Returning for a second year will be the beer and wine garden, Madjek, Inc. inflatable carnival and the Rough Stock Rodeo.

Andersen said she brought in more seating for the Thursday night rodeo, which proved surprisingly popular last year.

"We've done a lot of work to make sure we have enough seating so all people who want to see the rodeo can," Andersen said. "We have almost double the seats we had last year."

Just for rodeo night, there will be a beer-only beer garden set up at the

arena so, unlike last year, fairgoers don't have to pick between watching the rodeo and enjoying an adult beverage.

The fair received a grant from the Siletz Tribe to enhance the "kids' safety area," which has been moved to Building D.

Car seats, life jackets, and bike helmets will be given away as prizes, and a new booth offering fingerprinting and photo IDs for children has been added with grant funding.

"That is going to provide some really cool stuff in our kids' safety area," Andersen said.

If music is your thing, the fair has got you covered there, too.



Rough Stock returns

Rodeo set to thrill viewers, participants alike

he rodeo is back. After providing a rodeo at the Polk County Fair in 2015 for the first time in more than 15 years, Wild West Events Inc. is back with Hell on

Hooves Rough Stock Rodeo Thursday at 7 p.m.

"It surpassed all expectations last year," organizer Wayne White said. "It was the biggest night of the fair. Needless to say we're fired up about putting it on again this year. I guarantee people it'll be a good time."

This year's rodeo features bareback riding, saddle bronc riding, bull riding, barrel racing and mutton busting.

"This may be a 'small town' fair, but expect to see top-notch competitors," White said.

"Last weekend, we had some cowboys who were national finals qualifiers and also PBR finalists in the bull riding," White

The rodeo proved to be one of the most popular attractions at the fair in 2015, so be prepared to get there early if you want to stake out a good spot.

The fair has made that a little easier this year, providing almost twice as much sitting as the 2015 event.

"Other rodeos can run all day and some are anticlimactic," White said. "We try to pack lots of excitement into about an hour and a half."

Bull riding is just one of the heart-pounding events you can watch at the "Hell on Hooves" Rough Stock Rodeo at the Polk County Fair on Thursday night.

Adults arts, crafts bring surprising, unusual exhibits

trolling through the buildings at the Polk County Fair, you may notice artwork and crafts ranging from handmade cards to interesting sculpture.

"I've had some really unusual things through the years, like a leather saddle, a kayak, a wood-burned door," said Barbara Flugum, arts and crafts superintendent. "Everything that textiles does not, plus some textiles. It's always a surprise."

Flugum has been the arts and crafts superintendent for about 10 years, and got started by looking for volunteer opportunities in her church newsletter.

She is a crafter, and prefers quilting. Flugum enjoys seeing all the entries in the adult arts and crafts.

"I don't know what I'm going to get," she said. "It could be something totally unusual. Last year, I got a hanging wire, I guess you'd call it a sculpture, but it was all the things he'd picked up with his tractor and run over. I have a category called 'recyclables,' so that fell into there."

Last year, cardmaking was a popular category, promoted by local clubs.

"When I first began, scrapbooking was the big one," Flugum said. "I have some years that jewelry is the big category. I have some years I get nothing in."

In the arts and crafts — as in other exhibits throughout the fair — professionals are judged separately, so she encourages everyone to submit something to the fair.

Some years, Flugum said she gets categories with nothing submitted.

"Judges come from outside the county so as not to have a prejudice for or against a particular entrant," Flugum said. She also hosts a people's choice award, voted on by anyone who comes to the fair.

"Some people are a lot more talented than they think they are," Flugum said. "I would encourage people to enter whether they think they're good enough or not. The more entries we have, the more interesting it is for the people who come to the fair."

Along with arts and crafts, fair-goers can enjoy a peak at canned goods, decorated cakes and homemade candies in the food exhibits. This year, a Pinterest competition has been added to the food categories — complete with a photo of the Pinned item as found on the social site, so that you can compare the before and after.



Old-fashioned contests try skills from cooking to quilts

eeling a bit competitive while having a blast? The Polk County Fair has you covered with a variety of colorful contests to take part in.

Some, like the Beautiful Baby contest, are fairgoer favorites from years past.

"We try to give as many prizes away as possible because every baby is pretty," fair manager Tina Andersen said.

Others are new to the game, including the Pinterest contest — which involves finding your favorite recipe on Pinterest, making it and printing the pin along with the recipe to the fairgrounds.

"We either think up new contests or lots of times, the public will ask for a certain contest," Andersen said.

This year, the contests include cooking (Junior Chef, King of the Cook Stove and Queen of the Kitchen), 4-H — which includes the Monster Cookie, cake decorating, goat costume and livestock — a scarecrow contest, the ATV rodeo, Queen of the Textiles and an Oregon photo contest.

"The fun part of all our contests are those that enter and how excited people get about their entries," Andersen said.

Some of the contests will have special guest judges. Among them include Miss Oregon SW Natriana Shorter and Miss Oregon Teen USA Mikaela Bruer as part of the judging team of the Beautiful Baby contest; Rickreall Fire Chief Brad Weaver and Rickreall Fire Capt. Jake Gillins judging the goat costume contest and many, many more.

Get ready to stock your freezer Saturday

ring your checkbook and credit cards and head to the Polk County Fair on Saturday afternoon to bid on livestock at the annual Youth Livestock Auction, presented by the Polk County Livestock Association.

Youths from 4-H and FFA will show the animals they've been working on all year in hopes of attracting a high price for their prize livestock.

The experience can be a little intimidating for the inexperienced.

"If it's your first year, it's kind of a nervous thing for any kid," said Sven Olsson, who helps organize the auction. "When you're 10 years old, walking out with your animal in front of 150 to 200 people, it's kind of nervewracking. The thing that helps is being confident and how well they handle the animal in the auction ring."

The auction will again be held at 3 p.m. on Saturday in the

Swine Barn. The time was changed last year from an evening event to the afternoon, and turned out to be a good move for all involved.

It wasn't just fair vendors who benefited from the earlier start

"It was our highest grossing year for the auction by about \$70,000," Olsson said. "All that money ends up going back to the kids, which is great."

The auction is open to anyone — and people are free to donate, Olsson said.

"You can donate the whole animal or sell back the animal, either way you're supporting the kids," he said. "Otherwise, you can keep it for yourself and have a full freezer for the year."

He and his wife, Courtney, had more meat than they knew what to do with last year when they placed the winning bid on the grand champion turkey.

"It was 32 pounds dressed out," Olsson said. "That's a big turkey. The breasts were the size of tri tips — big tri tips. It was huge. It wouldn't fit in our oven. We boned it out and had to cook some in the smoker. But it was one of the best turkeys we've ever had."



Wine, beer return at new location to fair

Alcoholic beverage garden focuses on local, to offer better view of Les Schwab Stage

eer, wine and cider have a new home at the Polk County Fair, moving to a venue with a new brick patio and within sight of the Les Schwab Stage. The patio was installed partially because some old buildings on the fairgrounds needed to be removed for safety reasons. They were "being held up by the will of God" as Fair Board Chairwoman Anna Scharf characterized it.

Coincidentally, the new environment, between the main building and the stage, was just what beer and wine garden vendor Oregon Beverage Service was looking

"We are trying to make it more open and more inviting, but in a secure area," said Carroll Unruh, the owner of Oregon Beverage.

This is only the second year alcohol will be served at the fair and Unruh is aware of the reasons some in the county were wary of including it. He wants to calm those fears by hosting a beer and wine garden that enhances the fair experience, not detract from it.

"We are actually an alcohol management company," Unruh said. "We have to provide a safe environment, and that's our goal."

Unruh said beer, wine and hard cider options will focus on local breweries and wineries, including Roque, Gilgamesh, Hop Valley, Deschutes and Santiam. Two Towns Cider out of Corvallis will be featured for the growing hard cider fan base in the area.

"We would work with a Polk County focus and fill in from there," Unruh said, noting, yes there will be "macro brews" for those who prefer the big brands.

Oregon Beverage hosts beer gardens at 22 county fairs across the state and has seen an increasing volume of craft beer sales.

"We embrace the hand-crafted beer more than most companies," he said. "They want to see what they consume every day, and hand-crafted beer speaks to Oregon." The lineup for wine offerings has not been nailed down yet, but Unruh noted there are plenty Polk County wineries to choose from when filling out the menu.

The beer and wine garden will be open from noon to 9:30 p.m. (30 minutes before the fair closes each night) every day of the Polk County Fair.

Plethora of stuff for kids

he playground area and Building
D will be kids central at the Polk
County Fair.

Madjek, Inc., out of Salem, will be returning with its lineup of inflatable fun, including a slide, bouncy house and Zorb balls (human-sized hamster balls on water). New this year is a rock climbing wall and inflatable mechanical bull.

The company made its debut in 2015 after the fair couldn't book a traditional carnival. It was a success.

"It went really, really well," said Tina Andersen, fair manager. "They made three times the money that the carnival has in the past."

Nearby, Rickreall Fire Department will be holding its popular firefighting obstacle course for kids. It's a great opportunity for children to meet firefighters, try on gear, and race each other through the course.

Old-fashioned carnival games have been added to the lineup in the playground area, so kids — and their adults — can test their skills.

What has been called the "kids' safety area" has moved out of the playground area and into to Building D. The area will

feature information about car seat, bicycle and water safety, and drug prevention

Children will be taught what to do if they see a downed power line and see a crash-test dummy.

"There's a whole big hands-on kids' safety area, and it's all free," Andersen said

Thanks to a grant from the Siletz Tribe, the area has expanded to a childrens ID booth, where parents can have their children fingerprinted and a photo taken for identification purposes.

"It's something people don't think about, but it's good to have in case they were to ever disappear," Andersen said.

The \$3,705 grant also paid for bicycle helmets, life jackets and car seats that will be given away as prizes every day.

"We wouldn't have been able to put this together without them," Andersen said.

Back by popular demand is laser tag, something Andersen was encouraged to include by someone close to her.

"I'm really excited about bringing back laser tag, at the request of my grandson," she said.


