Outlook: Central had a spectacular 2016 season, advancing to the state semifinals.

The Panthers are eager to show they have retooled for another strong season.

Mendazona threw for 2,743 yards and 36 touchdowns as a junior.

"Anytime you have your quarterback coming back, that's always a plus," Hedrick said. "After what he did as a junior, Pete coming back is an exciting opportunity."

He'll be throwing to a largely new crop of receivers. Abraham is the leading returning receiver.

The biggest question will be who emerges at running back.

The Panthers' two leading rushers from 2016, AJ Morales and Alvin Berroa, both graduated. Central has several backs on the roster,

"The defensive line is good," Hedrick said. "If you can do the things in the trenches that you want to do on both sides of the ball, that gives you a very solid foundation to build on and we feel good about our trench work so far."

Up and down Central's roster, Hedrick said you'll find the talent and leadership necessary to be successful.

"Jammer Ruiz is unbelievable with his leadership," Hedrick said. "Not-so-much verbally

but with his demonstration. He's constantly doing the right thing. That speaks volumes. Jesse Cable will catch extra balls after practice every day. That's almost unheard of because the kids are tired. That kind of leadership right there is gigantic."

The Panthers will face stiff challenges in the MWC. Central was one of three MWC teams to advance to the state semifinals.

It may be an all-out war between the MWC's top teams, but Central is ready to wage it with the talent to survive.

"We are in a good position because we have three nonleague games," Hedrick said. "Pride-wise you want to win those games, but you've got to win league to move on. I think if you talk to the coaches in the league, it's all about staying healthy."


Translating on-field improvement to wins may be a tough challenge and finding ways to compete with the top teams in the league will require the Panthers to be at their best.

Those include Jeremy Labrado, Sickles and Burgess, the Mountaineers' three most potent playmakers on offense who will form the core of their defense.

With only 14 players out for football, the Mountaineers lack depth, but at full strength, Falls City could be the class of the league, Cook said.

The Mountaineers open the season with



Josh and Seth Dickson finally get a chance to compete

INDEPENDENCE — Central crosscountry runners Seth and Josh Dickson always imagined this moment.

Seth, a junior, and Josh, a senior, grew up playing the same sports, striving to top each other's accomplishments.

"We've always been competitive with each other, pretty much since birth," Josh said.

Seth injured his ACL, MCL had a meniscus tear, fractured bone and a bone bruise in his left leg while playing football his freshman year.

Doctors couldn't perform the necessary surgery until his leg was done growing.

"They had to drill through my bone," Seth said. "If they did it before I was ready, I could have one leg that was three inches shorter than the other."

He could do nothing but wait.

"The last two years, I've been thinking how would I be if I didn't get injured," Seth said.

He found ways to pass the time — including joining Central's musical theater and choir programs — but he was always watching and waiting for his chance to return to sports.

Seth served as manager for the track team and watched his brother.

"I learned that the most important thing is to keep moving forward," Seth said. "Josh, even when he was injured, stayed to support the team. He always runs as hard as he can. I learned to always strive to be better."

Finally, in March of this year, he had surgery done on his ACL.

Then came a six-month.

At long last, Seth began running with the cross-country team during the summer

Things were a bit different.

In his eighth-grade year, Seth was used to being one of, if not the, fastest person on the track. He was one of the top-ranked middle school hurdlers in the state and impressed coaches with his time in the 1,1500-meter run.

"His times in middle school would make any coach think that this kid could be special," coach Eli Cirino said.

Seth has to remind himself to take things slowly.

"Training is extensively hard," Seth said. "(Teammate) Jaydon (Aydelotte), who I used to run with all the time (in middle school), he zooms ahead now and I'm getting left in the dust."

Anytime frustration seeps in, Josh is there to help keep things in perspective.

"I tell him to keep thinking of his goals, and to not go out too hard, because that's how we get hurt in the first place," Josh said.

Central had its first race of the season on Saturday.

Seth was already dreaming of passing a runner in the home stretch.

"It's going to be ridiculously amazing," Seth said. "I've waited so long to compete. It'll be exhilarating."

Josh enters the fall looking to be one of the Panthers' top runners.

Seth?

That is much harder to predict.

"Honestly, I don't know what to expect from Seth this season," Cirino said. "We want to make sure we're bringing him along at a healthy pace, but he's already catching some kids."

Seth and Josh always figured their sibling rivalry would extend to high school. After a few speed bumps along the way, they finally get their shot.

"I think I'm faster right now," Josh said. "But I don't know. (Seth) might catch me this year."

Seth is already looking ahead to track; where he hopes to make his mark in the 1,500 or 3,000.

One thing is for certain — Seth will be running like a man on a mission.

"I've missed this so much, I'm working maybe twice as hard as some other guys," Seth said. "Some people take their talent or ability for granted. I don't because I know at any moment it could be gone."



Taking a team to state is one of the few accomplishments not achieved during Lankheet's tenure.




