Books by Local Authors

Bunkering down with a good book is one of winter's joys. And why not pick locally authored tales that draw their inspiration from life in the Gorge?

You can find selections at Waucoma Books, 212 Oak St.; Artifacts, 202 Cascade Ave.; and Klindt's at 315 E. Second St., The Dalles. With some guidance from Waucoma's staff, here's a sampling of recently published books by local authors:

"Search and Rescue: A Wilderness Doctor's Life-And-Death Tales of Risk and Reward"

by Christopher Van Tilburg, M.D.

A collection of harrowing first-hand accounts of search and rescue operations on Mount Hood and elsewhere, by wilderness physician and Hood River Crag Rat Dr. Christopher Van Tilburg. The tales in this 2017 release offer an inside look at how SAR teams work, as well as the importance of taking risks and how to mitigate outdoor accidents.

"All She Left Behind" by Jane Kirkpatrick Based on true events, Kirkpatrick relays an account of Jennie Pickett, a young woman who dreams of practicing medicine in 1870s Oregon. "As Pickett struggles to keep her dream alive, she finds that the road to fulfillment winds past love, heartache, and plenty of surprises along the way," a synopsis said.

"Six Years in the Hanoi Hilton"

by Amy Shively Hawk

The book follows the author's father, Capt. James Shively, a Vietnam prisoner of war who survived six years in captivity. After being shot down over North Vietnam, U.S. Air Force fighter pilot Shively endured brutal treatment in Hanoi prison camps. Includes a foreword by Sen. John McCain.

"Death on Tap"

by Ellie Alexander

A murder mystery set in Leavenworth, Wash., following an aspiring brewer in a German-themed little town. Fans of the style will also enjoy Kate Dyer Seeley's cozy Pacific Northwest Mystery Series. Try "Slayed on the Slopes," which takes place on Mount Hood.

"Elissa Blue: Book One of The Winged" by T.K. Perry

A young adult fantasy and romance novel in which the heroine, Elissa, gets her wings and sets off on an adventure to find a husband. The coming of age tale explores love and courtship in a human-butterfly society.

"Dishing Up the Dirt"

by Andrea Bemis

An eye-catching, simple, seasonally driven cookbook, featuring more than 100 inventive and delicious whole-foods recipes and dozens of color photographs.

Visionary Landscapes: Japanese Garden Design in North America by Kendall H. Brown

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Comfort Gifts

Hair raising travels and hair freezing temperatures are best offset with gifts of a soothing nature. The act of shopping for comfort items can also be a Zen experience, as options are plentiful and costs flexible depending on your budget. From little candles to hot tubs, the idea is how much relaxation the gift can provide relative to cost and convenience.

Scents

Soap and lotion: Toiletries don't scream "excitement," but they give an extra touch of warmth and joy to little routine moments. Cooking and cleaning are more pleasant when you have Italian-inspired Lemon Verbena scented hand wash — and you can get it at Bealls, 1801 12th St., if you don't have time for an international flight to the boot-shaped aroma land.

For ale enthusiasts, don't forget the beer-scented soap at Pacifica Gifts. No better way to kick off a morning shower than the scent of hops.

Candles: An instant mood setter. The Yankee Candles line, available at Gorge department stores, include crowd pleasers for the family setting like "Caramel Apple Cake" and "Berrylicious." If those make you too hungry, go with "Winter Glow" or "Sparkling Snow."

Essential oil: The "essential" refers to the sanity-restoring rest period the holidays are supposed to afford. The Airome brand has relaxing eucalyptus blends. Or try the locally supplied Hood River Lavender oil you can find at the Gorge Gift House, 204 Oak. St., downtown.

Softies

Bealls has great options and deals in this category, including baby blue Hannah jammies. **Blankets:** Sherpa throw blankets are made to swaddle. The Great Hotels brand are 100 percent polyester and "microlight." I have no idea what that technically means, but they feel great to hug. Price: \$19.99 on sale.

Pillow neck massagers, pink and "for her," according to their boxes at Bealls. They will work for women of all ages ... and the sort of man who's willing to trade a bit of his dignity for the product's "#sorelaxing" promise. Paint it black or camo if the rosy hue bothers you.

Spa

Convert your worries to steam, and lose stress in the suds. Hot tubs are a fairly high-end luxury, but we can dream, right?

True Gorge Spas and Stoves, 1414 12th St., has a line-up of classy tubs, some equipped with gadgets smarter than your average human — we're talking multi-colored LED mood lighting, waterfall and jets galore. I witnessed joy in the painted eyes of a penguin floating around in a "Resort Series" tub, which costs a little under \$14,000.

Another top-class option with fewer gizmos, the Northwest Series hot tub, goes for \$8,295. The store has other hot gifts for cold times, namely stoves and fireplaces, evoking a Mr. Rogers Christmas special feel. Of course these appliances will also work post-holidays. That's good, because our Gorge winters are known to drag on until we get a feeble sprig of spring that snaps and gives way to summer.



For the cooks you know, and love ...

They are busy this time of year as they bake cookies, cook holiday meals and make treats for gifts.

It may be time to look for a gift that fits with what they do best. Downtown has a couple of places to stop and pick something up for your cook: Arome on Oak and Mystic Mud (inside the Enchanted Alpaca).

Arome on Oak offers a variety of teas, spices, olive oils and balsamic vinegars. Arome also offers high-quality kitchenware.

Olive Oils: Arome has extra virgin olive oil that meet very strict standards by its maker and distributor. The olives are pressed within four hours of being picked. The freshness of the olive oil and the standards in place mean that customers will get an olive oil that has better taste and offers all the health benefits associated with olive oil. Arome's olive oils go beyond the typical olive oil. They offer infused oils. Some of the flavors include rosemary, blood orange, and Persian lime. Price: \$11 to \$32.

Balsamic Vinegar: Cooks can always find ways to use balsamic vinegar. There are meats to marinate and salads to dress and even a few desserts. It may be time to treat your cook to traditionally barrel aged vinegar. Arome's balsamic vinegar comes in the traditional to the infused — dark chocolate balsamic vinegar. Price: \$11 to \$32.

Gift Sets: If you aren't sure which vinegar or which oil to get, Arome offers sampler packs. The packs allow customers to customize the sampler with four or six of vinegars and oils. Price: Four pack — \$30; Six pack — \$44

Spices and Salts: Arome is the source for spices. The shop offers nutmeg, chili pepper and rosemary but it also offers harder to find spices. Cooks will find the Mediterranean spice Za'atar, sumac and Aleppo Chili. Arome also offers salts like black truffle sea salt and Oregon pure flake finishing salt. Price: Varies on spice.

Mystic Mud is the place to go if you want to get your cook something they can cook in or put their culinary creations on. The potter offers functional yet beautiful casseroles and platters. Mystic Mud creations can go from oven to the table. The handcrafted casseroles are designed to go in ovens as hot at 500 degrees.

Mystic Mud moved from its home at 104 Oak Street and is now found at Sophie's Enchanted Alpaca, 314 Oak.



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Ciders and Distilleries

WHEN it comes to cider, local bottle shops and grocery stores are an increasingly popular source for local Hood River and Gorge products. Taprooms at on-site cideries Slopeswell Cider and Ovino on the Heights and FoxTail in Odell, deliver a wide range of dry, sweet and tangy ciders all made from local fruit, and offer their wares in bottles or growlers (\$8 to \$25). The largest selection of local and regional ciders is found in a well-stocked cooler at Crush Cider Café, which also brews three of its own ciders at a separate location; glasses and growler fills are available on tap. The café features several varieties each of Gorge-made Slopeswell, Rivercider, Jester and Judge (Stevenson) and Runcible (Mosier) along with growler fills of its own ciders Mutt and Scruff and now Stray — shown in the glass at center — newly brewed from Newton and Hanner apples from Hood River. (You could say owners Sam and Guntram are dog-ged in their pursuit of good local cider.)

Speaking of growler fills, local cider can also be tapped at the following locations:

 Gorge White House, farm-produced cider in an expanded and updated tasting room, Highway 35 in Pine Grove

- Rack and Cloth, tasting room in downtown Mosier

— Mtn. View Orchards, pouring Golden Row, orchard-in-a-glass from the Parkdale-area farm on Trout Creek Ridge Road (check website for availability)

— Draper Girls, Highway 35 in Mt. Hood, starting again in spring 2018, but look for it at Crush all winter

FOXTAIL of Odell has expanded its bottled availability to Sir Isaac (its first, shown), Fuzzy Haven and Pear Affair, all in 22-oz., available at the Highway 35 café and in area groceries or bottle shops.

OVINO (aka Gorge Cider House) was among the first to produce cider commercially in Hood River. Stefan Gumperlein offers growler fills of his classic aged Newtown-Pippin cider; look for his cider infused with honey from Dee beekeeper Billy Edwards — in another year or so.

DRY CIDER from Double Mountain Brewery, a taproom favorite for the last three years, is now available in bottles at Double Mountain, 8 Fourth St. "For our first Dry Cider, we kept it simple and local," notes grower and brewer Matt Swihart, who uses a blend of freshly harvested local heirloom apples from Double Mountain Orchards near Odell and local Hood River Newtowns, Braeburns, Hanners and other apples for old world complexity. Find it in bottle shops as available, and on tap and in bottles at the brewery.

BOOKS and other ferment-related items are on the shelves at Waucoma Bookstore; shown are just a few titles, and a Drink Tac Toe game, all in the \$20 range.

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CAMP 1805 plans a Nov. 21 release of 100 Lashes bourbon (label not ready at press time), joining its stable of Mt. Hood vodka, Backbone rum, Surveyors Bourbon Barrel rum, Endurance white whiskey, and Downstream aged whiskey (375 ml, \$14 to \$26, and 750 ml, \$24 to \$48). 100 Lashes will be the first bourbon distilled commercially in Hood River. The 100 Lashes name continues the "tie-in to the Lewis and Clark theme," said ChrisTaylor of Camp 1805, at 501 Portway. (\$35, 375 ml only.)

HRD — Hood River Distillers' — downtown tap room and retail space, 304 Oak St., next to Doppio, provides a trove of distilled spirits, including brandy, grappa, gin, liqueurs, and flavored spirits (\$5.35 to \$49.95). HRD is best known for McCarthy single malt whiskey (\$54.95 for 750 ml) and pear brandy with the whole fruit in the bottle (\$79.95) made from Hood River fruit and distilled currently in Portland.

HRD staff can suggest a variety of options for cocktail DIY, ranging from mixing syrups and other Oregon-made ingredients to glass and metal ware. Prices range widely, starting with traditional stocking stuffer mini bottles.

LUCID: Get a little adventurous and get that sophisticated someone a kit comprising Frenchmade Lucid absinthe (\$32.75 for 350 ml), spoon and dripping device known as balancier (add \$20 for hardware). A VISIT to HRD on Oak Street is not complete without the one-room museum of HRD, and Hood River distilling itself. Located inside what had been the vault in the former First National Bank building, the room includes a well-lit timeline and artifact case and looping series of videos dating to the early 20th century.

NEWLY DISTILLED: Odell-area distillers FoxTail and Wanderback began distributing bottled spirits this year, joining existing distillers HRD and Camp 1805.

FoxTail vodkas (Peach, Blueberry, Raspberry and flagship Orchard vodka) all are made with juice from local fruit and are available at the Highway 35 café, joining the cidery's wide array of house ciders. Samples are available. In Spring 2018: brandy, from owner Bob Fox and brewer/distiller Justin Cardwell. Wanderback whiskey, made in Seattle (for now) and aged in a restored Odell-area barn by owner Phil Downer, is available at Oregon liquor stores, including Hood River, and at Whiskey Tango on Oak Street if you want a taste. Downer has plans to move distilling to Hood River County, but his aged whisky starts with barley he grows on his property.

Doug's Sorels - \$140

A tall boot that's ideal for those chilly winter days. This boot not only has some serious tread, but it also has major protection and a new sportier design. Stomp through the snow and slush without feeling a drip with the boot's water proof suede and textile upper and waterproof breathable membrane construction. The Sorrels are a perfect boot to keep warm in the cold days with its 100g insulation and a soft, cozy micro fleece lining.

Volcom Jacket (Gortex) - \$280

Whether you're riding up on the mountain or taking a walk outside, the Volcom Jacket with GORE-TEX guarantees to keep you dry, as well as comfortable. The GORE-TEX is a 2-layer laminate

shell for ultimate waterproofing, with a C-Science breathable lining system to keep the moisture off you. Although it's a heavy-duty jacket, this is just as much as a standard fit than a jacket for the mountain. This jacket allows for easy layering on those extra chilly days and if things get to warm there are zippered vents that gives excess heat a way to escape. GORE-TEX keeps you dry in the harshest conditions, sheds moisture for maximum comfort and keeps a focus on comfort and mobility.

Skis – Salomon \$70-150

For those ready to hit the slopes, considering your dived into your mountain experience with a pair of Salomon skis. A smooth All-Terrain Rocker in the tip, will help deflect snow with ease as you cruise your way down the mountain. The Salomon skis give you the best chance to tackle any snow that may be up on the mountain, so if you're ready to ride, grab a pair of these.



Boot Covers (Verglas Gaiters) – \$60

Lightweight and easily packable, that's only the beginning of what these boots are known for. The Verglas Gaiters get the job done in the heart of the winter as they're built with Cordura and Pertex Shield waterproof and breathable fabric. Amphipod (Reflective Vest) - \$40

Adventure is a key part of life in the Columbia Gorge. It comes in different forms from leisurely bike tours of the gorge to groomed snow trails perfect

for snowshoeing. Adventure is a great way to simply enjoy the region. It is also a great gift to give. So where to start?

Let's start with the leisurely adventure.



The Mt. Hood Meadows crew knows that adventure is more than just gear — it is experience. The ski resort hosts ski school to help people get the most out of their adventure. It starts with the instructors. At Mt. Hood Meadows, instructors aren't focusing on all the technical elements students are getting wrong. Instead, they work with the students to help them quickly move from the training area to the vista. Crews have shaped the terrain in the training area, so students get more sliding down hill experience. The goal is to get students to the vista on their first day. When they get to the vista, they will be treated to panoramic views of Central Oregon. Adventure, after all, comes with breathtaking memories.

The best way for you to gift a friend or love one this adventure is to purchase a \$100 gift card from Mt. Hood Meadows. This way they can book the day and time that works for them. The \$100 gift card will cover the cost of the lessons and rental (\$89 if they register online) and give them a little spending money for food or souvenirs.

And it doesn't just have to be grown-ups that are treated to lessons. Mt. Hood Meadows offers lessons for children. They plan to host three-day workshops during the holiday break. The ski resort hosts multi-week programs called Snoblasters and Trailblazers. Here children, get lessons and develop their skills. Each program is based on grade.

ADVENTURE IN THE COLUMBIA RIVER GORGE

MountNBarreL combines wine tasting and bike tours. Owner Ali McLaughlin started MountNBarreL as way to combine two passions: biking and wine. It came to her one day as she rode through the area, tasting wine: the area was beautiful, and the wineries had so much to offer. She asked herself, how could she make it come together — and then MountNBarreL was born. Customers are treated to a tour through the area, sampling the fruit of the vine and picking seasonal fruit.

McLaughlin offers two tours or allows riders to create a custom tour. The first tour is called the OG — short for Oak Grove. The 6- to 7-mile ride takes riders through the Oak Grove area (the westside of Hood River) with stops at a u-pick farm and area wineries. This tour is \$149 per person and includes wine tastings and light lunch pairings. A second option is the Pine Grove tour. This 8-mile ride includes wine and cider tasting as well stops at u-pick farms for \$159 a person. Pine Grove riders are also treated to a farm-to-foodtruck lunch.

Oregon E-Bikes has a way for you to ride through town, enjoy the views but get a little help as you pedal. They offer the electric bike. It is a bicycle with an electric assist. The e-bike lets a user get the benefit of pedaling but gets a little help. The e-bike makes it a little easier. It good tool to cruise and even to commute to work. It is also popular with customers. Oregon E-Bikes has received mostly positive reviews. In fact, workers say they frequently hear customers giggle after the purchase and start riding their e-bike. E-bikes start at \$1,200. Purchasing isn't the only option, you. Oregon E-Bikes offers bike rentals. Packages start at \$20 per hour to \$99 for an overnight rental.

Discover Bicycle staffers know that a bike on a dusty trail is just an awesome way to see the Columbia Gorge. They say that biking offers an awesome experience and is a great way to see the gorge. The area has several trails such as Syncline, Seven Streams and Dog River that are perfect for a mountain bike adventure. Bikes can be rented from Discover Bicycle. For a 24-hour period, an individual can rent a mountain bike at \$75; \$150 for a couple.

Mountain biking isn't the only option. The views that people can take in by riding along the roads or other trails, like the Mosier Tunnels. For a similar rate to the mountain bike rental, a person can rent a bicycle to ride. Discover Bicycle also offers e-bikes for those riders that need a little assistance — or those that don't want to work as hard. Those bikes are rented for \$20 an hour.

2nd Wind is can help you find a gift for your friend or loved one that likes adventure in the cold, white tundra. Or they think they do. The downtown shop offers gear for Alpine skiers, Nordic skiers and snowboarders. But they know how important it is to try gear first. 2nd Wind rents ski equipment. It is a good way to try the gear and a good way to see if winter adventure is right for you. A classic cross-country ski package or the skate cross country ski package can run between \$25 (one day) to \$100 (five to seven days). For those interested in Alpine skiing, the company provides an Alpine Demo package starting at \$45 for one day to \$90 for two to three days. If skiing isn't the adventure you want to give as a gift, try snowshoeing. 2nd Wind rents snowshoes — it is \$10 for one day and \$40 for five to seven days.

Skamania Aerial Park and Zipline can help you give the gift of flight – well sort of. The zipline adventure lets you put on a harness, hook up to cable and slide through the forest canopy. The tour takes riders along seven different lines — one is 900 feet lines. No experience is necessary since Skamania Aerial Park and Zipline have experienced zipline tour guides to help you through the tour. Zipline tour is \$99 plus tax.

If your gift recipient is a little more agile, then give them the chance to test their skills on Skamania Aerial Park. The adventure features several platforms and 22 elements for individuals to navigate. Aerial park is about \$69.






