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No room for vegetables? Pot up your plants

CORVALLIS, Ore. - Many vegetables grow well in containers located on a patio, porch, balcony or windowsill, so don't let lack of yard space keep you from gardening this spring and summer.

Limited garden space precludes being able to grow some of the larger vegetables, according to Brooke Edmunds, Oregon State University Extension Service horticulturist. For instance, growing corn on a balcony may not be practical. But a wide variety of crops can be planted, including lettuce, herbs, tomatoes, peppers, eggplant, carrots, beans, squash, radishes, strawberries, kale, chard and spinach.

There are some dwarf and miniature varieties, such as Thumbelina carrots or other baby vegetables that work particularly well in small con-

fines. Vine crops can be put in hanging baskets or grown in oak barrels or large pots and trained vertically on trellises, stakes or railings.

The amount of sunlight available will affect your choice of crops, Edmunds said. Root and leaf crops (beets, turnips, lettuce, cabbage, mustard greens) can tolerate light shade. But vegetables grown for their fruits, including tomatoes, green beans and peppers must have from six to eight hours of direct sunlight each day. The more sun the better.

Almost any type of container can be used, from bushel baskets, metal drums, and gallon cans to plastic tubs, wooden boxes and well-rinsed cut-off bleach jugs. Ten-inch pots are good for green onions, parsley and herbs. For plants with larger root systems, such as tomatoes, peppers and eggplant, five-gallon containers are best.

No matter what container type is used, adequate drainage is a must, Edmunds cautions. Drill drain holes along the side about 1/2 inch from the bottom and make sure the soil drains well. It also helps to elevate the pot with bricks or



boards, off the surface of your patio or pot saucer.

As in bigger gardens, container grown vegetables can be grown from seed, or they can be planted as transplants.

Good soil really helps. Use a packaged potting soil or composted soil available at local garden centers. These purchased potting soils make for excellent container gardening because they are lightweight, sterile and drain well. Do not buy topsoil; it can be heavy and drain poorly. Same thing with planting mix.

Plant vegetable seeds according to the instructions on the seed package, Edmunds said. After planting, gently water the soil, taking care not to wash out the seeds.

Vegetables grown in containers need regular fertilization. A soluble, all-purpose fertilizer that

can be mixed in water is the easiest type to use with container plants. Fertilize every three to four days with a solution that is half the strength of the recommended mixing ratio.

Dry fertilizers sprinkled on top of the soil offer a second-best alternative. If you use them, fertilize every three weeks. Organic materials including compost, animal manures, blood meal or rock phosphate and greensand can be used for fertilizer as well.

Religious regular watering is also essential, Edmunds said. The soil in containers can dry out quickly, especially on a concrete patio in full sun. Daily watering is not unusual, but don't let the soil become soggy or have water standing on top of it. Water when the soil feels dry and until it runs out the drain holes. After spring and early summer crops are harvested, the containers can be replanted with late summer and fall vegetables.

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Add your vehicle to spring forward safety checklist

As you set your clocks forward on March 11, and plan to check your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors, take a few steps to make sure your vehicle is safe and road-trip ready, says the non-profit Car Care Council.

• Check that all interior and exterior lighting is working properly and replace worn wiper blades so you can see clearly when driving at night and during spring showers.

• Check the tires, including tire pressure and tread. Underinflated tires reduce a vehicle's fuel economy and uneven wear indicates a need for wheel alignment. Tires should also be checked for bulges and bald spots.

• Check filters and fluids, including engine oil, power steering and brake and transmission, as well as windshield washer solvent and antifreeze/coolant. Dirty air filters can waste gas and cause the engine to lose power.

• Check the hoses and belts and replace if they become loose, cracked, brittle, frayed or show signs of excessive wear as they are critical to the proper functioning of the electrical, air conditioning, power steering and cooling systems.

• Check the brake system and make sure the battery connection is clean, tight and corrosion-free.

• Check if there is a defect in your vehicle on the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) website at www.nhtsa.gov/recalls by using the VIN look-up too. Watch a step-by-step video on how to locate your VIN and find out more about how recalls work.

"Checking your vehicle thoroughly and taking steps to have auto repairs performed before the spring and summer driving season will not only give you peace of mind, but will also help avoid the inconvenience and potential safety hazards of breaking down when you're miles from home," said Rich White, executive director, Car Care Council.

Your Brakes May Be Trying To Tell You Something

What To Watch Out For

• Hard Pedal: you must apply extreme pressure to the pedal before brakes engage.

• Vibration: brake pedal vibrates or pulses, even under normal braking conditions.

• Light: brake light is illuminated on your vehicle's dashboard.

Because brakes are a normal wear item on any vehicle, they will eventually need to be replaced. Factors that can affect brake wear include driving habits, operating conditions, vehicle type and the quality of the brake lining material. Be sure to avoid letting brakes get to the metal-to-metal point as that can mean expensive rotor or drum replacement.

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Heed the recall: Get your free airbag repair



(NAPSI)—If it hasn't happened already, your car dealer may call asking you to bring your vehicle to the dealership for a FREE urgent recall repair. For your own good and that of your passengers, you should do so.

The Problem

Some vehicles have airbags that do not function properly. Dealers have replacement airbags available and are urging affected vehicle owners to get their vehicles fixed for FREE. According to the National

Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), the airbags installed in tens of millions of U.S. vehicles are subject to recall due to a safety defect that may cause the airbag to explode and cause serious injury or death.

What's Being Done

Because so many cars and trucks need to be fixed across many different vehicle manufacturers, a nationwide repair schedule has been developed to get the most dangerous airbags replaced first. Exposure to high heat and humidity over time can cause metal parts inside the airbag to explode and shoot out of the airbag at the driver or passengers.

What Car Companies Are Doing

FCA US LLC ("FCA US"), vehicle manufacturer of Chrysler, Jeep, Dodge and RAM vehicles, has been leveraging many different means of communication to get the message to owners about the dangerous airbag safety recall, including: postcards, e-mails, phone calls, SMS/text messages, Twitter, Facebook.

2. Call your dealer to schedule the FREE repair.

3. Call the Chrysler, Jeep, Dodge and RAM dedicated toll-free customer care center at (866) 220-6765. They can help you with finding a nearby dealer, assist in obtaining alternate transportation while your car is being fixed, and update ownership information if you no longer own the vehicle. That way, you could save the life of whoever does have it now.

A. Visit NHTSA.gov to find out if your car or truck is under recall. Search using your 17-character Vehicle Identification Number (VIN).

A. Sign up at NHTSA.gov/Alerts to be notified if your vehicle is affected by a future recall. It's a good idea to check the site for recalls at least twice a year, in any case.

COMPOST WORKS FOR YOU

Not only does composting help the environment, but it can help your garden, yard, and house plants too! When compost looks like soil and smells sweet and earthly, it is ready to use. Here are some of the most common ways to use compost:

IN THE GARDEN

Before planting, mix a 4" to 8" layer of compost into newly reclaimed or poor soils. Mix a 1/2" to 3" layer of compost into annual garden beds at least once a year. Compost will add nutrients and beneficial microbes, hold water, and improve plant growth.

AROUND THE YARD

Spread a 1" to 6" layer of coarse compost on soil as a mulch or spread a 1/2" layer of sifted, weed-seed free compost on turfgrass as a topdressing. These can be done anytime of year to improve soil fertility and reduce watering needs.

ON HOUSE PLANTS

Sprinkle a thin layer of compost over houseplant soil to provide nutrients. You can also make a great potting soil by mixing one part compost with two parts sand and/or soil.

DON'T HAVE A GARDEN?

You can still make compost and use it on a house plant, give it to a friend, sprinkle it around a street tree, or use it in a community garden.

CHOOSE A SYSTEM

SYSTEM FOR FOOD & YARD TRIMMINGS RODENT-RESISTANT BINS

- For fruit, vegetables & yard trimmings (using "Mixed" compost recipe)
- For yard trimmings alone

For yard trimmings ONLY

- Requires "Active" composting (chopping & weekly turning to keep animals out)
- Usually inexpensive or free

FOLLOW THE BASICS

Thanks to friendly bugs and worms, composting is as easy as 1 - 2- 3" - no matter which recipe you use!

- **1 CHOP** materials if you want them to break down more quickly.
- 2 MIX "browns" (dry, woody materials) with "greens" (moist, green materials).
- **3 MAINTAIN** air & water balance by keeping compost as moist as a wrung-out sponge. Browns, Greens, Air & Water are the "big four" that will keep every compost pile happy.

"MIXED COMPOST"

For fruit, vegetable & years trimmings together. This recipe requires a rodent-resistant bin and active maintenance to prevent animal nesting and feeding.

INGREDIENTS:

Fruit, vegetable and yard trimmings (browns' and greens), water as needed.













you generate them by chopping them first into pieces 6" or smaller. Food scrapes need to be buried and mixed into the center of the pile. Never dump and run! Be sure to mix in enough browns to balance your greens. Feed as often as you like.

Maintain compost by turning or mixing it about once a week. Keep it moist as a wrung-out sponge.

Harvest rich, brown, finished compost by sifting our coarse, unfinished materials after 3 to 8 months.

A RECIPE FOR OPEN PILES

"ACTIVE" COMPOST

For yard trimmings ONLY. In open piles & simple bins, active maintenance prevents animal nesting.



DIRECTIONS:

Feed yard trimmings to your compost by chopping them first into pieces 6" or smaller, then mixing them into the pile. Feed as often as you like. Be sure to balance browns and greens.

Maintain pile by turning or mixing it about once a week. Keep it as moist as a wrung-out sponge. Covering it with a plastic tarp will help keep it moist.

Harvest rich, brown, finished compost by sifting out coarse, unfinished materials after 3 to 8 months.
