Veterans Bob Wallace and Phil Davis have a successful song-and-dance act after World War II. With romance in mind, the two follow a duo of beautiful singing sisters en route to their Christmas show at a Vermont lodge, which just happens to be owned by Bob and Phil's former army commander.

The dazzling score features well-known standards including

"Blue Skies," "Let Me Sing And I'm Happy," "Snow," "Let Yourself Go," "How Deep Is the Ocean," "Sisters," "Happy Holiday," "I've Got My Love To Keep Me Warm" and, of course, "White Christmas."

Dickens of a Christmas

Celebrate the spirit of Christmas on Dec. 16, as the Eugene Concert Choir and Eugene Concert Orchestra delight audiences with a fully staged "musical" performance of "A Dickens of a

Based on the classic story by Charles Dickens, the full 100-voice Eugene Concert Choir will be decked out in mid-1800s attire performing grand carols and music from the time period hailing from merry olde England. This original adaptation created by artistic director and conductor Diane Retallack takes Scrooge, played by Bill Campbell, on an unusual journey through Christmas past, present and future.

It's 'Fantastick' in Cottage Grove

The grand finale to Cottage Theatre's 2018 season is a beloved show that has the distinction of being "the longest-running musical in the world."

"The Fantasticks," with music by Harvey Schmidt, and book and lyrics by Tom Jones, opened Off-Broadway in 1960, and then ran continuously for 42 years to earn that distinction.

This timeless story has captivated the hearts and imaginations of generations of theatre-goers.

Featuring enduring classics like "Try to Remember" and "Soon It's Gonna Rain," "The Fantasticks" is a romantic, allegorical musical about a boy, a girl, two fathers, and a wall.

The neighboring dads trick their children into falling in love by pretending to feud.

Once Matt and Luisa discover their parents' deception, they reject the arranged love match and grow apart.

Following a series of disillusioning experiences, they finally find their way back to each other after realizing that, "without a hurt, the heart is hollow."

This show is the longest-running musical with good reason: At the heart of its breathtaking poetry and subtle theatrical sophistication is a purity that transcends cultural barriers. The result is a touching fable of love that is both nostalgic and universal at the same time.

"The Fantasticks," the final production of Cottage Theatre's 36th season, runs for three weekends at Cottage Theatre, Nov. 30-Dec. 16. Tickets: cottagetheatre.org or 541-942-8001. ◊
